## International Students' Frequently Asked Questions

<b>Will I need a visa to come to the UK?</b>	All non-EEA students are required to obtain entry clearance in order to enter the UK and you will have to get this before you travel.
<b>What evidence will I need to have to enrol on a course?</b>	You will need: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• your passport and any other immigration documents</li><li>• evidence of your English language ability</li><li>• documentary evidence of your educational qualifications</li><li>• details of your UK immigration history (including details of any studying you have done in the UK previously)</li><li>• details of any criminal convictions in the UK or elsewhere</li><li>• the results of health screening. This is applicable to certain countries only.</li><li>• proof of availability of funds for tuition fees and maintenance</li></ul>
<b>Is my deposit refundable?</b>	In some instances your deposit is refundable. Please refer to our Terms and Conditions and/or Fees Policy for further information.
<b>Who can I use to translate my documents?</b>	You must always use an official translation company. The full and original translation must include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• confirmation from the translator or translation company that it is an accurate translation of the original document;</li><li>• the date of the translation;</li><li>• the full name and signature of the translator or of an authorised official of the translation company; and</li><li>• the translator or translation company's contact details.</li></ul> <p>If you send us a translation of an overseas qualification or award certificate, we will not consider it as a direct translation of the academic level of that award. We will always use UK NARIC to assess the equivalency of overseas qualifications.</p>



## International Students' Frequently Asked Questions

<b>How long will it take before a CAS will be issued?</b>	A CAS letter will be produced when you have received and accepted an unconditional offer and paid 50% of the fees, providing you have met all of our academic and immigrations assessments. A CAS will not be issued more than 3 months prior to the course start date.
<b>Do I have to register with the Police?</b>	Some nationals are required to register with the Police within 7 days of arriving in the UK. When you are issued with a visa it will indicate if you are required to do this
<b>Can I work in England?</b>	Permission to work in the UK will be outlined in your specific visa conditions. However, a benefit of studying with us is that you will be allowed to work 10 hours per week term-time and full-time during vacation periods. Do not work more hours than specified on your visa otherwise you will put your place on the course and immigration permission in the UK at risk.
<b>Can the College help me find a part-time job?</b>	Our Careers and Employability team have details of part-time work available to students. When you enrol at College you will be able to visit the Service to find out what job opportunities are available and also get assistance in writing your cv and filling out application forms.



## International Students' Frequently Asked Questions

### Can I get medical treatment?

From 6th April 2015 Tier 4 students are required to pay an Immigration Healthcare Surcharge of £150.00 per year, which entitles them to free medical care, including hospital treatment from the National Health Service (NHS). You will however have to pay for prescription items, dental and optical treatment.

The sum of £150.00 is an annual amount. You will be charged the annual amount, at the point of your visa application, for each year of the maximum period of leave which could be granted under the immigration rules. If this period of leave includes part of a year that is less than 6 months, the amount payable for that part of the year is £75.00, otherwise the full charge of £150.00 will be payable.

**Please note that you must have insurance to pay the costs of returning home in an emergency or if you have an accident in the UK – “emergency repatriation”.**
